#### **Meeting Called to Order**

Central Florida Cares Health System, Inc. (CFCHS) Board of Directors' meeting was held on Thursday, August 19, 2021, at 3:00 p.m. at 707 Mendham Blvd., Suite 201, Orlando, FL 32825. The President called the meeting to order at 3:03 p.m.

#### **Consent Agenda**

Debbie Owens made a motion to approve consent agenda items, Ken Peach seconded; motion passed. There were no nays or abstentions. The Board By-Laws and Policies passed with 2/3 of the Board present.

#### **Overview of Declaration of Conflict of Interest**

The President gave a summary of Declaration of Conflict of Interest to members in accordance with Senate Bill 96 effective July 1, 2021, as well as a history of how conflicts were handled in the past with Directors abstaining from voting on provider contracts.

The President explained how the voting will occur in this board meeting by asking Directors that have conflicts to state their conflict if they choose, and then leave the room while the remaining Board of Directors vote. Directors had the opportunity to comment, ask questions, and declared further agencies that were not listed on the agenda.

#### **Declaration of Board of Directors' Conflict of Interests**

The President led the motions with the following language for each agency declaration:

<u>Insert name</u> makes a motion to accept the Conflict of Interest the Board of Director has for <u>provider agency</u>, <u>insert name by person seconding motion</u>, is there any public comment, any discussion, hearing none, all those in favor of accepting the conflict state by saying aye, all opposed indicate by saying nay, is anyone abstaining, hearing none, the conflict of interests are hereby accepted by two-thirds of Board of Directors present and in fact, is 100% of the Board of Directors present.

#### **Financial Report**

The CFO reviewed the June financials. The balance sheet details out the current assets of \$20,360,818, of which \$11,042,526 is in cash. Under liabilities, Advance Due to DCF, at the beginning of the year CFCHS loads the contract and are spending it throughout the year. This is expected to be at zero, but at year end DCF's Office of Accountability is going through the final FY 19-20 reconciliation. One provider had a pay back. The provider paid in July, so this goes off the balance sheet at that time. Ending the year, CFCHS is a bit more in the black than last year ending at \$231K. Last year ended at \$10K.

The Statement of Revenues and Expenses for the last 3 months and YTD is on page three. Personnel expense is \$1.788M, last year June 30<sup>th</sup> was at \$1.781M, which is less than a percent difference. Outreach and Awareness shows the balance of the expense for Project Opioid. Software developments from Five Points were expended.

Pages 4-6 are utilization expenditures for the Managing Entity, Mental Health, and Substance Use by OCAs, providers, and rates. Page 7 is the utilization rate by provider in a graphical format. The same provider expenditure totals are shown on page 8 in a table format. \$7.49M of funds were underutilized this past fiscal year, of that 56% will automatically carry forward. CFCHS has an additional 3% of carry forward and awaiting interpretation from DCF. Federal

dollars of \$1.626M will need to be reverted back. The \$1.626M is a significant reduction from the prior year where the federal payback last year was \$2.34M.

Page 9 shows the DCF amendments for FY21-22. CFCHS is waiting for Amendment 50 for the actual budget and contract to sign and the chart 8 to explain how to spend among all the cost centers.

Mark Broms made a motion to approve the June 2021 financial report as presented; Ken Peach seconded; motion passed.

#### **Organizational Updates:**

- FY2021-22 Budget CFCHS personnel are in the process of comparing the new Schedule of Funds to last year's budget. We are awaiting guidance from DCF to provide chart 8 to see what is allowable with those cost centers and adding new costs centers with the additional funding.
- FASAMS data system rolled out July 1, 2021 and has been challenging for the MEs, the network, and DCF. The MEs are having discussions on how to pay the providers in the first quarter and then reconcile after the quarter ends. Providers are putting in data in FASAMS. CFCHS will pay the network 1/12<sup>th</sup> and the plan is to reconcile with the network after the first quarter.
- CFCHS' Operational Policies will be reviewed by the BOD.
- CFCHS continues to have staffing and hiring challenges.
- QR Code flyer that scans to our website.
- Orange County Government and CFCHS are conducting a Behavioral Health Symposium entitled *Better Together*. See flyer in your packet.
- Health Departments received funding and want to contract behavioral health services with CFCHS.
- CFCHS continues to meet with DCF Secretary at CFCHS' offices.

**Planning Council** – Nelson Kull was not in attendance.

<u>Other/Public Input</u> – The Secretary commented there are covid related funds available through a Brevard RFP for \$1.2 million in September. The CEO will share the link with board members when received.

The next Board of Directors' Meeting will be Thursday, October 21, 2021, at 3 pm.

Debbie Owens made a motion to adjourn, Ian Golden seconded, motion passed. The meeting

adjourned at 4:37 p.m.

#### Meeting Called to Order

Central Florida Cares Health System, Inc. (CFCHS) Board of Directors' meeting was held on Thursday, June17, 2021, at 3:00 p.m. at 707 Mendham Blvd., Suite 201, Orlando, FL 32825. The Vice President called the meeting to order at 3:04 p.m.

#### Financial Report

The CFO reviewed the April financials. The Small Business Administration issued a letter stating the PPP loan was forgiven in the amount of \$288,000. The balance sheet details out the current assets of \$19,275,315, of which \$11,556,324 is in cash. There was an increase in cash

and a decrease in AR due to receiving two months of payments in April from DCF. Under the liability section, in accounts payables, services provided decreased from March into April. The CFO indicated that providers will be paid at 100% for May expenditures in June and as long as DCF pays CFCHS as scheduled, June services will be paid for at 100% in July.

The Statement of Revenues and Expenses for the last 4 months and YTD is on page three. There was an increase in program services. Personnel has an increase due to one hire and fully accruing the merit component. The negative \$51 in April is for a supply return. Outreach and awareness are at \$348 for April, and will show as a \$25,000 credit next month as payment was received from another ME for opioid webinars and will be reflected in the May financials.

Pages 4-6 are utilization expenditures for the Managing Entity, Mental Health, and Substance Use by OCAs, providers, and rates. The CFO provided details related to the OCA's where spending year to date was approaching normal expected levels year to date for some and will hit the target by year end, others that may not hit their target by year end, and potential reallocation of some OCAs.

Page 8 is the utilization rate by provider in a graphical format. The same provider expenditure totals are shown on page 9, in a table format. Page 10 shows the DCF amendments thru 05/01/21.

Mark Broms made a motion to approve the April 2021 financial report as presented; Luis Delgado seconded; motion passed.

#### **Consent Agenda**

Valerie Holmes made a motion to approve consent agenda items, Babette Hankey seconded; motion passed.

#### **Provider Contracts**

The Ad-Hoc Contract Committee met on May 24, 2021, and this year 18 contracts were reviewed. Some of those contracts had a renewal clause and seven of those 18 contracts were renewed. Eleven contracts were new. The committee approved all contract recommendations at that time.

Transition House was monitored in December 2020 and placed on a CAP. Since then, Transition House still was not meeting their compliance requirement in services provided as anticipated. The concerns were shared with the Executive Committee and the Ad-Hoc Contract Committee members due to the nature of the contracts expiring on June 30, 2021.

CFCHS met with Transition House, and a moratorium on their residential and outpatient services were put in place for 30 days. Transition House will provide CFCHS an improvement plan for approval, CFCHS will revisit Transition House after two months to see if the improvements have been made and if not, CFCHS will RFP after 3 months. CFCHS met with Transition House and issued a letter of non-compliance and DCF was notified and copied on the letter. The recommendation is to extend Transition House's contract for a 6-month renewal.

Mark Broms made a motion to accept the contract proposal extension and new contracts with the exception of Transition House with a 6-month renewal clause, Enrique Aponte seconded, motion passed. Voting occurred individually.

#### **Nominating Committee**

The Nominating Committee Chair spoke of the committee interviewing two potential candidates for board membership. The chair gave an overview of each candidate.

Valerie Holmes made a motion to approve Sherri Gonzales with the Children's Home Society, and Amber Carroll with the Brevard Homeless Coalition, as new CFCHS board members. Enrique Aponte seconded; motion passed.

The CEO thanked Tara Hormell, Children's Home Society, for all her support she has provided CFCHS since 2012.

#### **Merit Policy**

The Vice President gave a recap of the Merit Policy put in place last year. The policy indicated if there were funds available at the end of the fiscal year and staff could not obtain a 3% standard raise, to allow for a one-time merit. It was recommended at the Executive Committee to give employees a raise along with a merit pay. The CEO stated this action will not impact the 2025 projection due to vacancies all last year and for this period.


Luis Delgado made a motion to approve the Merit Pay plus a raise for this period this one time, Valerie Holmes seconded, motion passed.


