Meeting Called to Order

Central Florida Cares Health System, Inc. (CFCHS) Board of Directors' meeting was held on Thursday, June 20, 2024, at 3:00 p.m. at 707 Mendham Blvd., Suite 201, Orlando, FL 32825. The President called the meeting to order at 3:01 p.m.

Consent Agenda

Debbie Owens made a motion to approve the consent agenda as presented, Freddy Morello seconded; motion passed.

Financial Report

The CFO reported on the unaudited April 2024 financials. The balance sheet through April 30, 2024, shows the Cash in Bank at \$6,333,882 and Accounts Receivable were at \$23,008,265. In March, provider reconciliations occurred and the equivalency of two-months’ worth of provider services were completed. As providers are paid, cash decreased. Bank interest rates are increasing so Interest to DCF Current Year will be increasing as well.

On the Income statement, budget columns were added to reflect year to date for 10 months. Legal fees incurred were from the pharming and phishing incident. Outreach and Awareness campaign with Balley Sports came due for \$51K. Office equipment is not utilized year to date, but in May was an expenditure for six new Surfaces.

It was suggested by members that when we have computers to donate, rather than give to the company who wipes the computers clean and then they donate them somewhere that it would be nice to give to agencies in our catchment area.

OCA’s – ME Admin expenses were shown YTD through the month ending April 30, 2024. The ME utilization was 61.5% with a target of 82.6%. The Mental Health utilization was 80.6% with a target was 82.6%. Substance Use utilization was 70.2% with a target of 78.6%.

Pages 4-6 show utilization by OCA, by provider. Page 7 is a summary of the OCA’s with low utilization and explanations were provided. Pages 8 and 9 show no new data.

Pharming incident - The CFO presented in real time the funds recovered to date. CFCHS received an email from the Secret Service indicating \$474K will be released to us in August or September. Traveler's Cyber insurance paid \$250K. American Family Insurance is general liability and underwriters are processing, and that payment of \$1M should be received at the end of June or July. Funds used in Admin carry forward of \$1.7M leaves an adjusted balance not at risk of \$284K.

Justin Saenz made a motion to approve the April financials as presented, Steve Lord seconded, motion passed.

Provider Contracts

The COO stated the contracts were reviewed by the Ad-Hoc Contract Committee. She discussed the Department are the ones who procure and award PPG contracts. CFCHS will be notified on June 28th which providers received the award. Then providers will be notified by email that CFCHS will contract with them July 1st.

The CEO explained that Lotus Behavioral had previously been placed on a corrective action plan and the Committee initially approved all contracts except for Lotus Behavioral. Since then, Lotus has made great progress and is now in compliance. At the last Committee meeting, members agreed to approve the Lotus Behavioral contract.

Wayne Holmes made the motion to approve the pending contracts as presented by the Ad-Hoc Contract Committee; Justin Saenz seconded; there was no discussion, no public comment. Roll call followed:

Meeting Called to Order

Central Florida Cares Health System, Inc. (CFCHS) Board of Directors' meeting was held on Thursday, April 18, 2024, at 3:00 p.m. at 707 Mendham Blvd., Suite 201, Orlando, FL 32825. The President called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m.

Consent Agenda

Debbie Owens made a motion to approve the consent agenda as presented, Ana Scuteri seconded; motion passed.

Financial Report

The CFO reported on the unaudited February 2024 financials. The balance sheet through February 29th shows the Cash in Bank at \$21,498,458 and Accounts Receivable are steady at \$12,386,583. The prepaid insurance amount gets spent down on a monthly basis. Accounts Payable were \$8,895,220. Liabilities are at \$101,922, in Interest Income and Other Payables to DCF, due to interest rates earning more and ultimately payable back to DCF.

On the Income statement, Program Services Expenses in February were at \$8,778,270 and were lower compared to the last 2 months due to less utilization by the Network Service Providers. Key expense items in February are conferences and the outreach and awareness campaign with Bally Sports streaming. Professional Services Other at \$36,058 is mostly from the Pharming and Phishing incidents for legal and forensic review.

OCA's – ME Admin expenses were shown YTD through the month ending February 29, 2024. The ME utilization was almost 51% with a target of 66.4%. The MH utilization was 57.1% with a target was 64.3%. SU utilized was 54% with a target of 62.7%.

Pages 4-6 show utilization by OCA, by provider. Page 7 is a summary of the OCA's with low utilization and explanations were provided.

Page 8 shows CFCHS's DCF Contract budget history showing \$129.4M with Amendment 67. Page 9 shows the history of DCF funding since FY 16-17. The Current year Admin rate is 3.13%, where in FY22-23 versus FY23-24, the budget increased from \$119M to \$129M. Basically, 97 cents of every dollar in the network goes to the network.

Freddy Morello made a motion to approve the February financials as presented, Ken Peach seconded, motion passed.

Nominating Committee

Organizational Updates

- ITN – there have been no updates for the ITN or other grants that were submitted.
- Bank Search – CFCHS is looking to replace their current bank with another bank who can offer services that CFCHS currently does not have and start with them at the beginning of the fiscal year. The Finance Committee will review the three recommendations brought to them.
- Pharming – Secret Service has not released any funds. Traveler’s insurance is looking for underwriters for the \$9M and the \$1M for the cyber claim. CFCHS has recovered another \$10,000. The Texas state attorney filed criminal charges against one individual involved in the laundering scheme. The court date is April 11th.
- Organizational Policy Review – CFCHS is currently reviewing and updating internal policies and revised and new policies are being reviewed by board members. CARF’s accreditation expires in December, and this is the next step towards reaccreditation.
- Attorney – CFCHS is looking to replace their current attorney with another attorney who is more contract-focused with more expertise. The Executive Committee will review the three recommendations brought to them. The new attorney would start in the new fiscal year.
- Logo – will be discussed at a later date.
- Contract Manager has been hired.

CTS Presentation

Carolyn Capern and Greg Trujllio presented on “Own Your Recovery.” Members gave feedback following the presentation.

Planning Council – Has not been appointed yet.

Other/Public Input – Ian Golden had two Sunshine disclosures. On April 3rd he and Ken Peach were at the Space Coast Health Foundation’s Task Force meeting where they spoke of behavioral health issues. Also, on April 11th he and Amber Carroll of the Brevard Homeless Coalition were at the Brevard County Manager’s meeting discussing homeless issues and the Encampment bill. Community events were showcased by members.
